Fellow Veterans, Legion members and friends of same, as we seek to add membership, we should remember a basic principle. People join, or pay for, that which gives them value. We need to be the experts on the challenges, opportunities and resources available to Veterans. During my tenure as your Senior Vice, I will share what I have learned being a Veteran and working in the Veterans Space. This month, I want to share what I have learned about the decisions that Veterans make.

We have all read, or known, the Veteran who does not want to go out, or leave their residence or venture very far into the civilian world. One reason that may happen is the decisions that are required to function in the service, in theater and in the civilian world.

I attended a seminar hosted by a Veteran who was also a psychologist at Jesse Brown VA hospital. In that seminar I learned that while in theatre, an average troop makes about 3000 decisions a day. This may seem like a lot, until the doctor said that the average civilian makes 9000 decisions a day. At first glance, this might seem like a disconnect, something must be wrong. In fact, there is nothing wrong, it is the way it is.

While in theater an average troop does not decide on whether to shave or not, on what to wear "(perhaps which boots to wear)" or what to eat. Troops do not select the route they will drive nor even where they will sit while in movement. However, in the civilian world, all of these are daily decisions that need to be made, in addition to a whole lot more. This has implications when Veterans return.

Upon return, many well-meaning family members ask 'where do you want to eat'; 'what do you want to do'; 'where do you want to go'. The answers can be vague to nonexistent. In addition, they may overwhelm the Veteran who can then react by hiding away from those family members. This can cause disconnects and fractures in the relationships. Understanding the decision model can reduce stress.

If someone likes pizza, and joins the military and deploys, they will like pizza when they get back. So understanding the decision model, a family member simply states that they are leaving for pizza at a given time, and the Veteran will be ready to go. The decision capacity returns quickly so this understanding is really only recommended during the first couple of weeks upon return. However, a tremendous amount of stress can be relieved. As a Veteran, this knowledge becomes key for you to be able to share with your networks. It is value, that can then be converted into an invitation to join the American Legion and other Veteran Service Organizations.

Next month, I will share the "Sheep Dog" mentality, whose understanding can again, relieve stress in relationships and provide value to others.





I came across a message recently by Robert Jeffress a well-known pastor of a Dallas, Texas based Baptist Church and would like to share it with you. Pastor Jeffress suggests we all have a story to tell or a story to share with others as to how God has made a difference in our lives whether during times of stress and suffering, during struggles with our faith (we all go thru that), during unexpected moments of joy and triumph or receiving answers as each of us contemplates what our purpose is here on earth or understanding God's will. Scripture is clear that he has a plan for each of our lives, to reach the full potential of all that we were meant to be! Each letter in the word story stands for an important element in preparing the structure of our story. "S" is for Scripture. Read God's word as it pertains to your personal story and include specific scriptures which make your story come alive with the changes you experienced, comfort you received or new lesson that was learned. "T" is for Talk to Others. Seek out friends, family or when encountering new people don't be afraid of bringing an encouraging word through telling your story. It just might show them how to cope with a situation when you give them hope by how you dealt with adversity. "O" is to follow your heart as God leads. Pray before you tell your story that you may encourage others while glorifying God. Ask God to give you the right words and attitude as you prepare to give your story. "R" is to receive the talents and special abilities God has given you and act on them. We all have been given certain gifts like patience, communication, mercy, helps, leadership, listening, wisdom, discernment, counseling or service to veterans or the poor. If you don't know what your gifts are consider taking a course offered at many churches on finding and using effectively your spiritual gifts. Finally, "Y" means to yield to the Holy Spirit. Ask the Holy Spirit through prayer to help you tell your story by giving you the right words, to guard your tongue and give you the faith and courage to effectively make a difference in other's lives. Remember, the greatest joy in life is in helping or serving others! Took me a while to discover this important truth. Good luck in developing your story. Just be yourself, and you will make a positive and even significant difference with those who share your story!

Several Saturday's ago I found myself standing in line at City Hall with many others as I awaited my turn in paying final respects to Mayor Emeritus George Pradel. He served as Mayor for almost 20 years. The Mayor had taken ill several weeks before and was admitted to the hospital. Severe neck and back pain caused by a tumor spread quickly through his body and on the morning of Tuesday, September 4th, George Pradel passed away. Also, about a week before John McCain passed away after a long battle with cancer. Both men were veterans. Mayor Pradel served in the United States Marine Corps, while John McCain served as a navy pilot during the Vietnam War. His plane shot down, he was taken captive and became a POW for 5-1/2 years; where he was interrogated and tortured at the infamous "Hanoi Hilton" prison. McCain was later released and returned to the United States where he entered politics and eventually was elected a US senator from Arizona. A final observation on the passing of these two servants and veterans. Both men loved their country and both men loved people. Mayor Pradel never really sought politics. He was everybody's Officer Friendly! Friends and family encouraged him to run, and on election night Pradel won by just over 2,000 votes. He served from 1998-2017. McCain despised political hatred and individual arrogance and self-promotion no matter what party was in office. He loved the flag! Mayor Pradel was a kind and energetic man whose affectious and positive spirit so defined his character! Our deepest and heartfelt prayers go out to the families of these two men who believed in serving others with civility, passion and dignity, for supporting just causes and in expressing their faith in God. You both will be greatly missed!

History Lesson for This Month

Who Was Billy Williams?

-He was born 18 years before the beginning of the Spanish-American War, to John and Harriet Mitchell. John was a wealthy Wisconsin Senator whose father founded the Milwaukee Road and the Marine Bank of Wisconsin.



- -He grew up in West Allis, a suburb of Milwaukee.
- -He enlisted in the army as a private at the age of 18, at the beginning of the Spanish-American War.
- -Because of his influential father, he was soon commissioned an officer, and remained in the army.
- -He's often referred to as the "Father of the U.S. Air Force".
- -He's the only individual for whom an aircraft has been named: the Billy Mitchell B-25, of which "Doolittle's Raiders" flew 16 from the deck of the USS Hornet to bomb Tokyo in early 1942.

A unique characteristic of Mitchell was his bold and profound predictions, most of which were rarely heeded. For example, in 1906 while serving as an instructor in the Signal Corps at Ft. Leavenworth, KS, he predicted that major conflicts in the future would take place in the air, and he never held to the common belief back then that "the Great War" would be the end of all wars.

In March of 1912, after assignment to The Philippines, and touring the battlefields of the Russo-Japanese War, predicted that war with Japan was one-day inevitable.

A year before the US entered WWI, in July of 1916, he was promoted to Major, and appointed Chief of the Air Service of the First Army. He became one of the top combat pilots of the war, along with his friend Eddie Rickenbacker. He was highly decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross, the Distinguished Service Medal, and several foreign decorations. But he antagonized army administrative leaders with his arguments and criticism of their resistance to his ideas of more emphasis on air power. He insisted that a battleship could be sunk by bombing from an aircraft, even though skeptics said it would not be possible, and later was able to prove it in a pre-planned bombing of 3 leftover German ships from the war, a destroyer, battleship, and a cruiser, and 3 obsolete US ships.

Promoted to Colonel and eventually Brigadier General, and reduced in rank more than once, in 1924 after an inspection tour of military sites in Japan and other parts of Asia, he submitted a 324 page report suggesting a "future war with Japan", including an attack on Pearl Harbor, 17 years prior to when the attack eventually took place!

In 1925 he was brought to court-martial, for "insubordination after accusing Army and Navy leaders of an almost treasonable administration of the national defense." Included in the panel of 12 judges for his trial were such recognizable names as Major (then) Douglas MacArthur, Hap Arnold, Eddie Rickenbacker, and Fiorello LaGuardia, all of whom allegedly voted for acquittal. Nevertheless, he was convicted and suspended from active duty with no pay (later changed to half pay by Pres. Coolidge). He resigned from the service.

He died in 1936 at the age of 56 before he could observe several of his predictions. He posthumously was awarded the Medal of Honor, and the airport in Milwaukee is officially "General Mitchell International Airport."
